Step Two - Once you've told your child why they're special, pick a challenge your child is facing in the upcoming year, such as a big move or a new job. Acknowledge their fear, but provide encouragement and hope. The purpose of this paragraph is to help your child "see beyond" the obstacle in their path and remind them of their "special future".

Step Three - You've shared something that you love about your child, and encouraged them about the tough things ahead. For paragraph three, write out a statement of genuine commitment, sharing how you and the Lord are committed to this child – no matter what. This fifth element of the Blessing provides assurance that you'll always love your child through both the good times and bad and reaffirms your commitment to their success.
